

October 2024 Block of the Month – Dutchman's Puzzle

My flying geese turn out the best when I use the four at a time method, making them slightly oversized & trimming them down. Those are the instructions that I am including. Please use the method that works best for you!

Cutting Instructions

For 12" Block

A One 7 ¼" square, Goose

B One 7 ¼" square, Goose

C Four 4" squares, Sky

For 6" Block

A One 4 ¼" square, Goose

B One 4 ¼" square, Goose

C Four 2 ½" squares, Sky

- 1. Make the flying geese blocks. Draw a diagonal line, from corner to corner, on the back **C**. With right sides together, place two **C** on top of each **A**, in opposite corners, lining up the diagonal line. The **C** squares will overlap corners in the middle. Pin.
- 2. Sew a scant ¼" seam on both sides of the drawn diagonal line.
- 3. Cut this unit in half right on the drawn diagonal line. Press the seam allowance toward the smaller triangles.
- 4. Place another ${\bf C}$ square in the corner of each unit, so that the diagonal line is perpendicular to the other ${\bf C}$ units you just cut. Pin.
- 5. Sew a scant ¼" seam on either side of the drawn line. Cut on the line and press seams toward the smaller triangles.
- 6. You will now have four Flying Geese units. These are sewn and cut on diagonal/bias edges, they can be a little wonky. You will need to square up your blocks. Trim to 3.5" x 6.5" for the 12" finished block. Trim to 2" x 3.5" for the 6" finished block.
- 7. Sew your flying geese into pairs, paying attention to the orientation. Sew the pairs into a four patch, again watching your layout.
